Church crawlers

For April, 21 members enjoyed a trip to St Martins in Dorking. Although there has been a church on this site since Saxo-Norman times the modern church dates from 1873 when Dr Samuel Wilberforce, the Bishop of Winchester, laid the foundation stone of the West Tower. Sadly he was killed two months later by a fall from his horse. The tower and spire were then named in his honour as the Wilberforce memorial. The top stone of the spire was put in place in April 1877. The main feature of this church is the amount of stained-glass windows and opus sectile decoration. There is a memorial to the composer Ralph Vaughan Williams in the entrance and there is a beautiful memorial in opus sectile to Lily, Duchess of Marlborough who was a very generous benefactor of the church. When she died in 1909 the whole town seemed to go into mourning and her obituary filled nearly two columns of the newspaper.





Our Cherry Tree

As part of the 40th anniversary celebrations for the u3a in the UK which was in 2022 we asked Epsom & Ewell council if we could plant a commemorative tree.

This has been a long-drawn-out process but finally we are pleased to announce that our tree has been planted in the car park at Bourne Hall over near the payment machine.
