Exploring London 13 were out of Central London for June's walk and were wandering the streets of Woolwich and taking in the river views!

We learned (even though it was obvious, it came as a revelation to some) that Woolwich was the former home of the Woolwich Equitable Building Society.

The lovely building, since sold by Barclays, remains a striking feature. Next, we nipped into Woolwich town hall, not only to use the facilities, but to admire the interior, a rare example of Edwardian Baroque and a popular wedding venue.

We completed the circular walk passing the ferry crossing, foot tunnel and new housing developments on the Riverside.

The walk ended in the Royal Arsenal area, now part of a housing and leisure development, where we pondered the contrast of old and new.

All were fascinated with the sculpture of workers called "The Assembly" by Peter Burke. We went our separate ways after an alfresco lunch and were able to make use of the new Elizabeth line connection back to Central London.

For our May visit the church crawlers went to St Nicholas at Thames Ditton.

Above the chancel arch are painted boards depicting the Day of Judgement known as Doom Pictures which date from around 1570. This one consists of 11 oak panels of different sizes and shapes. They were discovered in about 1893 when a Mr. Birtles bought them from a carpenter's yard in Kingston. They were obscured by whitewash and paint but have since been restored.

This church has one of the finest fonts in Surrey which dates from about 1120. On the four faces there are depictions of an Agnus Dei, a goat, a star and an unusual cross.

We admired the Erasmus Forde monument and the Forde brass which has the earliest depiction of the phrase 'Que Sera Sera' which is shown as an armorial motto.

We also discovered another stained-glass window designer, Geoffrey Webb who was a pupil of both Charles Eamer Kempe and Sir John Ninian Comper.

#### <u>Volunteering stories</u> - Ann Norman <u>London Open Gardens - June Weekend Event</u>

It's funny but being a member of the U3A opens all sorts of other doors into other organisations. Just chatting to other group members about their interests can find you involved in all sorts of activities you were not aware of before. That is how I found out about the Open House Festival. This is held over a couple of weekends every September, where you can do one off ad hoc volunteering at all sorts of interesting places. Talking about this with another group member introduced me to the London Open Gardens Festival, where she volunteers, which takes place over a weekend in June. A couple of years back I put my hand up to be a floating volunteer and so can be allocated any garden that is short of staff to man the entrance.

This June we had a wonderfully sunny weekend, and I was allocated a slot at Lincolns Inn, where I was told they had over a thousand visitors the previous year. There were two of us per shift manning the gate taking entrance fees or checking tickets and pointing out the events that were planned over the day. Neither of us had ever worked with this garden before, but we were made to feel like royalty by the head gardener, with lunch supplied and all eventualities covered. It's not a low-key event, one of our garden visitors had to rush off as she had won a ballot ticket to visit the 10 Downing Street Garden.

After our morning shift we could then visit the garden we were manning or take a trip to one of the 100 other gardens that were open on one or both days that weekend. As a thank-you we get a weekend ticket, a booklet of maps showing the gardens open in an area, and early access to book garden visits and walks that are by appointment only. This year I took a guided tour to the Aga Khan Gardens in Kensington and a garden walk in Westminster, which funnily enough ended up at Lincolns Inn where I had worked a shift the day before!

The Open House Festival, focussing on historic and modern buildings and often guided by volunteers and professionals, will be taking place in September. To get into the most interesting buildings planning is required, or alternatively a volunteer's pass. Another good reason to become a volunteer. Exploring London 8 - For our June walk we started at Kings Cross. In St Pancras we admired the bronze statue by Paul Day called The Meeting Place. We also learnt about the frieze that was added to the base in 2008. The frieze depicts various scenes from the history of the tube and train: people queuing on platforms or travelling in carriages; soldiers departing for war or returning injured, and repair work following the July 2005 London bombings.

We then wandered across the Regents canal admiring the bookshop barge 'Words on the Water' and explored Coal Drops yard before heading towards Gasholder Apartments where a one-bedroom apartment apparently sells for £1.2 million!!

# Weald & Downland Museum

# Tuesday October 24th 2023

The Weald & Downland Living Museum – a hidden gem in the South East, quintessentially British in a picture-perfect setting. We are a museum for those who want to see, touch, and even smell what life was really like for people living in years gone by. Whether you are 5 or 95 there is something for everyone.

The Weald & Downland Living Museum is a large 40-acre site that showcases its historic buildings in keeping with the time periods they represent. Some of the historic buildings are not fully accessible to all visitors.

To create an authentic atmosphere at the Museum, the paths around the site vary in materials and are uneven by nature. The centre of the Museum site is mainly flat with parts set on sloping ground, which is steep in places.

Access around the site is on rural surfaces; mainly rolled or loose chippings, which are in keeping with the nature of the site and buildings. Some paths are cobbled and their surfaces may cause difficulty for visitors who use a wheelchair or have impaired mobility.
