



In November u3a members joined Andrew's regular Magic Moments clients for an evening at the Royal Albert Hall. The show was entitled Icons Rediscovered and featured The Nutcracker Act II followed by Iolanta. This unusual combination was commissioned in 1890 by the Director of Moscow's Imperial Theatre following the success of The Sleeping Beauty. He commissioned Tchaikovsky to compose one opera and one ballet. Together they would become his last opera and ballet, completed just two years before his death.

Our seats were excellent and close to the stage. The conductor was Vasily Petrenko who is the musical director of the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra. It was fascinating to watch the way that he controlled the orchestra. I had never been close enough to see in such detail the signals given. He was incredibly animated as he swayed to the music and gestured to the musicians exactly when to come in and the timings for each piece. It was fascinating trying to work out exactly which musician was going to play next.

Act II of the Nutcracker is best known for the Dance of the Sugar Plum Fairy which is the centerpiece with the unmistakable sound of the celeste.

Part two was the opera lolanta which was played out at the front of the stage with the backdrop of the orchestra. lolanta is a love story with a twist. The story was excellently depicted and there were screens with subtitles to enable you to follow the story. In a highly unusual move, the strings are completely silent throughout the Introduction – instead a gloomy combination of woodwind and horns, with a poignant solo cor anglais, set the scene. It was fascinating.

The Ballroom dancing group started in October 2022 and is still going strong. Originally aimed at complete beginners, we can now consider ourselves 'Improvers.' It is unlikely now to be suitable for beginners, but, if you have some experience – from a range of a little to quite a lot – you could find the sessions useful and enjoyable. You do not have to have a partner and – so far – we have not had to resort to ladies dancing the man's steps.

Here are some comments from a couple of our members:

"Tim is an excellent dance teacher, he's very patient, going over the moves, giving plenty of help. It's well attended and I have made a new group of friends. We have all come a long way since starting and it is an excellent exercise for the body and brain. It may take a while before we dance at the Blackpool Tower ballroom but we are all having a great time!"

"Tim Palmer is a professional dancer and teacher and it is a real treat to be taught by someone with so much knowledge and love of his dancing style. He is teaching us routines and moves and repeating them and reusing them to encourage our confidence on the dance floor!"

Most of the site is accessible to those with limited mobility except for our bus fleet, nature trails, the Billingshurst Signal Box, and some viewing platforms.



Surrey Network Study Day Rembrandt from Fame to Poverty to Final Acclaim

On 17th November I attended another interesting study day covering the well known Dutch artist - Rembrandt.

Colin Wiggins, who was the Special Projects curator at the National Gallery until 2016, gave an excellent insight into the life of the artist providing facts about his personal life, which in some ways was quite tragic.

Rembrandt's fame began during his lifetime and by the time he was 30, his work was represented in Charles 1's Royal Collection. He was highly successful and it was rumoured that people had to beg, as well as pay, Rembrandt to paint for them. One of his most famous paintings is 'The Night Watch', which shows his incredible talent.

Sadly, his success and fortune waned after the death of his wife Saskia, with whom he had one surviving child, due to he and the nurse he employed, to look after Titus his son, having their own child. Their relationship was condemned by the Dutch Reformed Church, after which the respectable folk of Amsterdam turned away from him.

Rembrandt was alone and in poverty at the time of his death and buried in an unmarked grave.

I have attended a few of these study days on various topics and always find them interesting. Good value too at just £12 for members (guests £15)

SCATTERED SQUALOR - DOWNLAND HOMES: ASPECTS OF HOUSING HISTORY

Between the wars there was an enormous growth in British suburban housing, but not all were Tudorbethan semis with clipped lawns and an Austin 7 in the drive. Many were what are now termed 'plotlands', but in the past had harsher terms applied - hutments, track and shack or simply shanty towns. These plotlands are a largely ignored aspect of our housing history but one that has implications for present day and future UK landscapes.
