Alresford Watercress Festival Sunday May 19th 2024 from 10.00 – 16.00

Nationally acclaimed Annual festival attracting thousands of visitors to New Alresford in Hampshire to celebrate all things watercress.

Every year on the third Sunday in May the streets of this Georgian town are closed to traffic to transform the town into a family-friendly FREE festival.

From street markets, food & drink stalls, cookery demonstrations with renowned world class chefs, the Hampshire Farmers Market, a "Kids Zone" featuring Falcon Displays and Circus Skills, there really is something for everyone. For many the highlight of the day is Watercress Eating Championship which takes place at 15:00 on the main stage - a must see event hosted by our very own redoubtable Paul Rees keeping the participants in order and the crowd in stitches.

Trip advisor review: The James Bond film "A view to a kill," with Roger Moore, was partially filmed at (what was then called) Amberley Chalk Pits Museum. The mine entrance (near to one of the railway stations) was the main item shown in the film

This trip will be of interest to members who like Social History, Science, Communications, Technology and Transport all of which feature at the museum.

Exhibits include a working print shop, which is the only one of its kind in the South of England. The BT Connected Earth exhibit shows the history of communications, with interactive displays for all ages to enjoy. Our lime kilns are scheduled ancient monuments, which date back to when the site was once a working chalk quarry. The Life of Lime exhibition shows the history of the chalk quarry and its importance in Sussex's industrial working past. Our museum is also home to traditional crafts people such as the blacksmith. There is also a pottery on site, where our resident potters will showcase their skills on selected days. We also have our own industrial narrow-gauge railway.

We have booked three additional experiences for members to enjoy which each last for 20 minutes. Orientation Talk, Amberley Museum 10 objects, High Voltage Demonstration.

This was only opened in June 2023 and was crowd funded, a real hidden gem. Then on to St James Court, with an amazing frieze of characters from Shakespeare plays. At St Ermine's hotel we viewed their WW2 SOE display. Our walk finished in Queen Anne's Gate, where we learnt that at one time a wall was built across the street to stop carriage 'rat runs.'

The hall is a legacy from Margaret Glyn in approx. 1946 and has a long history of serving the community. The original legacy was to enhance the learning, education, and social welfare of the local community and is therefore very much in line with the u3a ethos.

The current trustees are delighted to announce that after a long struggle with the local planning authority the plans have now been approved for the demolition of the existing hall and the construction of a new hall for the community.

They will over the coming months be starting various fundraising initiatives and would like the local community to get involved as much as possible.
