Lots to enjoy!!!


Our visits to the Baitul Futuh Mosque started on February 8<sup>th</sup> when the first 20 members were welcomed by Farukh and the team.
















# Explore the State Apartments inside Speaker's House, including a special display for this year only.

We have booked two visits. Thursday April 11<sup>th</sup> at 3.30pm and Thursday August 22<sup>nd</sup> at 11.30am. We are strictly limited to 16 members per visit. Tickets £20 per person

This year marks 75 years since the Commonwealth of Nations was established. Our special display features fascinatina archival documents, photographs, and past and present gifts, many of which have never been put on display before. They tell the story of the Speaker's and UK Parliament's diplomatic relationship to other Commonwealth countries and its significance around the world today. Displayed within the beautiful surroundings of the Speaker's State Apartments, visitors will see photographs of the late Queen Elizabeth II's address to the Commonwealth Parliamentary Assoc. in Westminster Hall, behind the scenes guests lists and menus from State Dinners held in the State Dining Room, the gold and black robe of state worn by Speaker Hoyle to Kina Charles III's Coronation and this year's international Commonwealth anniversary events.







The Church Crawlers have had a few months off during the colder weather and we restarted in February with a very well attended visit to St Peter's in Woodmansterne.

Twenty-four members were welcomed to the church Bus Stop community café, coffee, biscuits, and warm sausage rolls for £2 per person, a good start to the day. The church had set up additional seating for our group and once suitably refreshed we wandered over to the church for our visit.

St Peter's was built in 1877-8 although there has been a church on this site since the Domesday book. Most unusually this church is not a listed building (thankfully said the rector, Revd. Alison Elson).

St Peter was the leader of the apostles, and is the patron saint of among other things Locksmiths as he was given the keys to the Kingdom of Heaven.

The porch of the original church was moved outwards when the 1961 extension was built to accommodate the growing local population. The font was made in 1845 and some mystery is attached to its whereabouts after 1870, it was possibly abandoned in the churchyard, which is a similar story to the font at All Saints Kingston where the font had been used as a bird bath before being reinstalled in the church.

The church also has a most unusual bell ringing arrangement which was very difficult for some members to resist playing with!!!

WICKED is based on the 1995 novel by Gregory Maguire – Wicked: The Life and Times of the Wicked Witch of the West. It takes a look at the Land of Oz with new eyes and creates a parallel journey to the familiar The Wonderful Wizard of Oz by L. Frank Baum.

At the core of WICKED is friendship, in this case a very unlikely one. The blonde and very popular Glinda and a misunderstood green girl, Elphaba. They first meet at school and after a bumpy start, they form a strong friendship. Their journey takes a turn during a visit to Oz to meet the Wizard where during that encounter their lives take very different paths. Glinda is lured into a powerful and public role while Elphaba remains determined to be true to herself and the people in her life, whatever the cost – both paths seeing them fulfil their destinies as Glinda The Good and The Wicked Witch of the West.

This winter our group has braved the weather, umbrellas in hand, guided by our well-informed leaders on visits to Guildford Cathedral and Shad Thames.

Both places are well known to many of us, but we found that there was so much more to them, seen from an architectural perspective. A close study of the cathedral offered many unexpected vistas and surprises.

We looked at the regeneration of the Shad Thames area from the early 1980s to the present day, focusing on repurposed Victorian architecture and 19th and 20th century warehouses. Pioneered by property developers of the 1980s. Terence Conran and Andrew Wadsworth, this was also a period of onstruction of new properties designed by modernist innovative architects such as the CZWG practice and RIBA gold medal winning Michael Hopkins. Next month, our group will be investigating the Piccadilly area.

# ALEXANDER LITVINENKO: THE SPY WHO SOLVED HIS OWN MURDER


