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### Proposed changes to the Third Age Trust

Firstly, an explanation of who are the Third Age Trust and what do they do.

There are over 1000 independent u3a's in the UK with over 400 thousand members, most u3a's are registered as charities in their own right. The Third Age Trust is the umbrella organisation that arranges things such as our public liability insurance, trustee indemnity insurance and offers guidance on policies etc.

Following several years of scrutiny, the Board of the Trust have been undertaking a consultation on governance of the organisation. The present structure was seen as out of date and the elected board did not have the necessary skills and experience for today's charity requirements. The proposal below will be discussed by the current board of trustees in June and if it goes forward will be voted on at the Third Age Trust AGM on 16<sup>th</sup> October.

The proposal includes:

<u>A smaller board of trustees</u> experienced in oversight and compliance who would have legal responsibility to ensure charity and corporate law is followed, ensure financial integrity and approve the trust budgets.

<u>A u3a council</u> to represent the member u3a's and focus on giving a voice to local u3a's needs, and wider u3a priorities and initiatives.

Trustees and council members would be elected from the u3a members across the nation.

Our Epsom and Ewell executive committee will discuss this proposal at our next committee meeting. Each u3a has a number of votes at the Trust AGM depending on their size, we have 3 votes to cast.

For any members who would like more details of these changes, the relevant documents regarding the proposals are available on our website on the dedicated 'Fit for the Future' tab.

None of this will directly affect us as each u3a is an independent part of the overall movement but it is important that members are kept up to date with developments at Trust level.

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In May Tony led Exploring London 8 for a walk from Waterloo, through Charing Cross passage to the newly refurbished Embankment café for morning coffee and then a stroll through Embankment Gardens with a detour across the road to look at Cleopatra's needle and the 'dolphins' on the benches.



At least they're meant to be dolphins but they have scales and serpent's tales, so not exactly a true likeness.



We looked at the numerous statues in the gardens which include: Robbie Burns, The Imperial Camel Corps memorial sculpture, Robert Raikes, Sir Wilfrid Lawson, Richard D'Oyly Carte and finished at the memorial to Sir Arthur Sullivan of Gilbert and Sullivan fame.



Sullivan's memorial is a weeping Muse of Music, who is so distraught her clothes are falling off as she leans against the pedestal.

At the bottom of the pedestal is a mask of Pan, sheet music from the Yeoman of the Guard and a Mandolin inscribed with the sculptor's name W Goscombe John A.R.A. 1903 which is the year it was erected.

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Ten of our group boarded the 293 bus from Epsom to Morden, and then into Morden Hall park last Wednesday. If you do not know this area, it is a truly beautiful National Trust Park, crossed by the River Wandle and many small streams. Although it was a little drizzly during our morning, we enjoyed the lush green of the park. Shortly on entering we discovered the old water mill which once powered the Snuff mills, turning tobacco into snuff during the 18th and 19th centuries. We had a brief sighting of the original Morden Hall, which was once a school, then a military hospital during the first World War and later a hospital for women and children.

Our group crossed over the River Wandle over the famous White bridge, then entered the rose garden, which is just beginning to burst into colour. This garden will be well worth a visit in a week or two, if the sun decides to reappear! Our walk ended with coffee and cake in the Stable Yard Cafe. Nearby there is also a small, but attractive, garden centre and gift shop. A lovely morning walk, only slightly curtailed by the drizzle.

There is much to discover on the history of the park - just ask Google.

Our u3a committee meets bi-monthly and have for the last two years held our meetings at Birchgrove, Lower Mill in their library.

As our committee has now returned to pre-pandemic numbers the library is unfortunately no longer large enough for our needs. We are very grateful to Lower Mill for accommodating us and thank them for their hospitality.

We have therefore been searching for a larger alternative venue and are very pleased to have arranged with Atkinsréalis at Woodcote Grove to use one of their boardrooms for our future meetings.

This is a free service that they offer to locally based charities.





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Where can you visit and see a tribute to Bob Marley, Guy the Gorilla, a couple of Sphinxes, an abandoned aquarium and prehistoric animals? The answer is Crystal Palace Park.

The whole area has seen many years of neglect and grand plans that were later abandoned. It is now maintained by the London Borough of Bromley in partnership with Crystal Palace Park Trust. Lottery funding has seen a start on the work to repair and restore the dinosaur area whilst plans to restore the Victorian grade 1 listed Italian terraces have been submitted.

The group found the area fascinating and for those who enjoy walking it forms part of both the Capital Ring walk and the Green Chain route.

Gail guided us around a large section of the park and explained its uses and changes over the last 175 years. Some of the group had lived near to the park in younger years and one remembered going there to watch motorcar racing on the Crystal Palace circuit.

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Exploring London 13 visited Crystal Palace Park, starting our walk from Crystal Palace Station, which was built when the Great Exhibition was moved from Hyde Park in 1854. Our first visit was to the restored dinosaurs' statues. Benjamin Waterhouse made the statues with the help of Richard Owen who invented the word "dinosaur "in a first attempt to see what they looked like. To promote the statues a New Year's Eve dinner was held with 11 diners sitting inside the Iguanodon. The area was landscaped from rocks guarried in the UK. Though now covered by weeds you can still see the layers. We leisurely strolled through the park, stopping for refreshments, and then visited the War memorial for the Royal Navy Volunteer Reserves in the Great War. The Crystal Palace concert bowl has now been replaced by the music platform (called the Rusty Laptop by locals). In the past famous musicians played here. They included Bob Marley, Elton John and Vera Lynn. We made our way to see the terraces and Sphinxes. The Sphinxes have been restored and painted red, as they are based on the red granite Great Sphinx of Tanis in the Louvre Museum. The Italian terrace is still to be restored. The Crystal Palace TV transmitter built in 1950 replaced John Logi Baird's TV station and transmitter in 1933, built on part of the site of the 120,000-gallon sea water aquarium in 1871. Sea water was brought in by train from Brighton. When the public lost interest in 1890, the tanks were drained and monkeys occupied the tanks. The remaining foundations are next to the transmitter.

We made our way past the surviving Italian mosaic subway (being restored) of the lowlevel train station, to a French Café St Germain for an enjoyable lunch, completing our walk to Gipsy Hill Station, with a view across London. Unfortunately, the weather was cloudy so we could only see vague shapes on the horizon.



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# **Walking Cricket**

Joining the u3a introduces you to a variety of interesting activities. Through the u3a I joined the Walking Cricket group. It is run under the umbrella of Epsom Cricket Club in conjunction with Surrey County Cricket Club and involves regular training sessions, indoors during the winter and outdoors during the summer. There are also games arranged against other clubs.

It is open to all genders who are interested in playing the game and are over 60 years of age.

A team consists of 8 players and everyone contributes by batting, bowling and fielding. As the name suggests the most important rule is to walk at all times and not to run.

Recently the team Epsom Thoroughbreds were involved in a knockout competition. Epsom got to the final and won, becoming the Surrey Walking Cricket champions, retaining the trophy they had won the previous year.
