Garden Visiting Group August

This month the garden visiting group went a little further than normal. Our car sharing convoy went to Oxfordshire to visit Greys Court and Nuffield Place with our National Trust cards.

Both the gardens and the houses were a treat to visit, the staff at both were generous with their time in explaining the history of these two very different properties which were closely located. Fortunately, the weather held off for most of the day, the 11 of us that were able to attend had another excellent day out.





Architectural Explorers August

This month Lesley took us to Barons Court, an area that was unknown to many of us and full of fascinating buildings, including some wonderful artist studios. It's clear that development in the area has had an impact, but the backwater streets full of individual properties and intriguing sights made for an interesting visit. It was made even better by a pub lunch in one of the best hidden pubs [and theatre] our group has yet visited.





Church Crawlers

For September we visited Holy Trinity in Wallington. This is a relatively young church compared to some that we have visited as the current building only dates from the late 1860's. The church is very community-orientated and runs a very nice café on Thursday mornings and they made us very welcome.

After coffee we adjourned to the main part of the church and learnt a little about the team that run the church and some of the history. We were then joined by Anthony Reeves, the recently retired church warden, who told us all about the recent refurbishments. Firstly, the community rooms and café were added in about 2004 after £1.4 million had been raised for the work. As part of that development the vicar released part of his garden which he said was far too big to be manageable and the space was more useful to the church.

That was phase one and phase two meant more fundraising for the main part of the church. They successfully raised over £1.5 million and Anthony explained in detail what that money had been spent on.

One item was the organ which had stopped working and the gentleman who visited to give them an assessment regarding the repair just happened to have worked on the organ in the 1960's when he was an apprentice. His report noted that the organ was more 'Fiat' than 'Ferrari' and was not worth restoring. They therefore removed the organ and, like so many churches, they now rely on an electronic organ that has a very authentic sound. As part of the refurbishment, they removed the old pews and added stackable chairs which makes the church into a very versatile community space: they now have space for a band, also services continue to be live-streamed for parishioners who cannot attend the church.

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




Crossness Pumping Station

JOHN RUSKIN AND 'THE STONES OF VENICE

John Ruskin (1819–1900), whose life spanned the Victorian era, became the most celebrated and influential art critic of his age. Author of countless books, and a gifted draughtsman, he was a polymath whose interests ranged from literature, art and architecture to geology, early photography and the sciences. His work on Venetian architecture is best remembered in his three-volume masterpiece, 'The Stones of Venice', published from 1851–53. Sarah will discuss his life and Venetian work in this illustrated talk.
